Joyous January? A time of Hope?

We've just experienced the Christmas season with all its hype, tinsel and glitter. The bright lights in the shops and windows of houses, the street decorations have been dazzling. But now we are entering a new year and soon the decorations will be removed, leaving us feeling flat.

As the new year opens, perhaps you're facing uncertainty, owing to your health, family, friends, finances, or for other reasons. Are you, like me, overwhelmed by what is happening in the world around us? Could you do with a bit of real hope?

And what is *hope* anyway? Is it like wishful thinking, when we say, 'I hope it won't rain!' Rather



like wishing we could run for the

bus, or sing beautifully like the singers we heard on the radio over Christmas.

'Hope' in the Bible means a confident assurance based upon God's promises.

Isaiah, the Old Testament prophet, tells us that God's message is, 'Comfort, comfort My people.' Comfort is the Hebrew 'to take a breath.' The English word fortify comes from the same root. So God is telling us He is there to strengthen us to go forward into the new year with confidence, despite the problems in our lives, and in the world around, even if we don't yet see the solutions.

All those years ago, God comforted His people by promising that a Saviour would come. And even now, in the 21st century, our hope is based on the fulfilment of this promise in the New Testament in the coming of Jesus. A verse you may know is found in the Gospel of John chapter 3:16:

For God loved the world SO much, that He gave His one and only beloved Son, that whoever believes in Him, should not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world.

The word 'gospel' means good news, which is just what this amazing promise is. Jesus' coming demonstrates that GOD LOVES YOU - unconditionally. He loves you, because He loves you, not



because of who you are or because you're a 'good' person.

This promise is particularly good news, - if it is **true**. Christians believe it is, because Jesus is not an invented character in a story book. We are not dealing with a 'long, long ago in a land far, far away' tale. **The Bible sets Jesus in the real national, local and political history of His time.** Secular writers like the Roman, Tacitus, Josephus, the Jewish historian, and many others refer to Jesus. In Luke 3:1 we read that Jesus was active ...

...in the 15th year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar, when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, Herod tetrarch of Galilee

During the high priesthood of Annas and Caiaphas,

Rather like saying, 'When Charles was king', or 'When Rishi Sunak was prime minister.'

The hope that Jesus brings is real because Jesus is real.

We can only experience this hope if we turn back to Him to receive His forgiveness. That is what being a Christian means. Not 'I am a good person', but 'I am a forgiven person.' Not 'I hope I am going to be ok, because I've tried hard.' But 'I have a confident assurance, because of what Jesus has done.'

When we become a Christian, we have hope for the present in this world knowing that God is with us and a hope for the future in the life to come. Why not read the personal story of a Vintage Adventure recipient, who has experienced this for herself?

Hope in the present. Hope for the future Goff and Gill's story as told by Cynthia

In 2014 my brother, Goff, and his wife Gill, moved from Amersham to live in a beautiful home in Berkshire. They were just a few miles from one of their daughters and her family. Everything seemed perfect. Until shortly after they were settling in, Goff received the unexpected diagnosis of terminal prostate cancer.



Goff was remarkably positive throughout the five years, which remained for him, unfailingly thankful for the precious gift of each day. Of course, there were moments of tears and life was sometimes extremely hard. But Goff and Gill believed in Jesus and every day committed their lives and circumstances to the Lord. Gill still finds



comfort in reading the handwritten notes Goff jotted in his Bible, which they read together each morning.

Amid some dark times, we exchanged many text messages, and in one, Gill wrote, "Incredibly difficult days but

keeping our eyes on Jesus." Strange as it may seem, Goff and Gill experienced a deep peace in all the uncertainty about what each day might bring, as well as true joy. Gill once explained that joy for them meant Jesus Over You. They held on to the fact that God was still in control, and His promises real and reliable.

One of the passages Goff highlighted in his Bible is in the last book, Revelation, chapter 21:

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth had passed away and there was no longer any sea. I saw the holy city, the new Jerusalem coming down out of heaven from God ... and I heard a loud voice from the throne, saying, 'God's dwelling place is now with His people. They will be His people and God Himself will be with them. He will be their GOD. He will wipe away every tear from their eyes. There will be no more death, or mourning, or crying, or pain, for the old order of things has passed away.'

In Revelation symbols describe the indescribable. At that time in the

Hebrew culture the sea symbolised separation from one another but more importantly from God. So here we see God's promise of a future, in which we are restored into a loving relationship with Him and with other



people, how we were originally created to be.

A future full of hope, especially for those of us experiencing pain, fear, sorrow, and anxiety. God is telling us, as He told Goff and Gill, life will not always be like this. There **IS** a hope and a future.

And for those coming towards the end of our earthly life, God promises eternal hope too. One of the fears about dying, is going through death alone. We can't take anyone with us – except, if we're a Christian, we have Jesus, Who has promised to never leave us nor forsake us. There is no longer any sea nor separation from God. Instead we have a wonderful hope for now in this world, certain that

God loves us, giving us meaning, purpose, and daily strength, and a future beyond this life when our time comes.

Just four days before his death in 2019, on their wedding anniversary, when he knew he would soon be called home to Jesus, Goff wrote in the beautiful card he gave Gill, 'Secure in the arms of Jesus for eternity.'

Our times are in His hands.'

Goff's hope was not wishful thinking, but a confident assurance that the hope promised by God in the past had been fulfilled in Jesus, giving hope in the present right up to the final moment of his life, and for an eternal future, knowing that he was going through death WITH Jesus - to be with Jesus forever. Gill believes that for Goff, Jesus transformed death into a glorious new beginning, and that one day they will be reunited. As she says, "Hope for me means **He Only Purchased**Eternity."

'Strength for Today, Bright Hope for Tomorrow'

As we start a New Year, we'd like to let you know that your friends at Caraway are in the process of developing further resources to support those of you who are housebound or who do not get out and about

very often these days, and may therefore be feeling lonely and isolated. Our new resource is the Positivity Toolkit, designed to encourage positive mental wellbeing through a mix of activities, ideas and information. Our intention is

for the toolkit to help provide hope, laughter and fun for those of you who would appreciate additional support, including those of you living with dementia.

We aim to tailor The Positivity Toolkit to each person's needs and interests. You will find it has been carefully created in warm, uplifting colours, and each item bears the logo 'Strength for Today, Bright Hope for Tomorrow', presented in a cheery yellow bag. Several core items that Caraway has produced will be available with each kit such as:

Positivity Cards - 50 Ideas of things to do

Research shows that being proactive is beneficial to mental health, so these cards are tactile, bound by a ring, and offer motivational ideas of positive ways to pass the time.

Gratitude and Hope Journal

A colourful daily prompt to think of the good in life, encouraging positive thoughts and building resilience, with space to write your own thoughts and feelings.

Guide to Thinking Positive

This short guide is full of uplifting images and ideas to keep you looking on the bright side. You will be able to explore meditations along with techniques for processing negative thoughts and learn how to deal with them in a healthy, gentle way.



And of course there will be other surprise items in the toolkit which will help personalise it just for you! If you are happy to receive them, it may include items of faith such as a holding cross, bible study notes and uplifting bible verses.

Once you have received a visit from an Anna Chaplain or Caraway volunteer, who will go through the resources with you, you will be able to dip into them yourself in between visits. So, watch this space!
