Reflection In the beginning, GOD



Over the next few months, we are going to focus on the account of the Creation in the opening chapters of the first book in the Bible, Genesis. In its printed form, Genesis has 50 chapters, only two of which directly concern the origins of the universe. They are there to set the scene for what follows. Let's begin with Genesis Chapter 1 and the first few verses.

In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth. Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness was over the surface of the deep, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters. And God said, 'Let there be light,' and there was light. God saw the light was good, and He separated the



light from the darkness. God called the light 'day' and the darkness He called 'night.' And there was evening, and there was morning – the first day.

'In the beginning GOD' These opening words of the Holy Bible put us at once into the world of space and time. They show us that GOD was there at the very start **before** the creation of everything else.

In the New Testament, Jesus is reported as asking the Father to glorify Him 'with the glory which I had with You before the world was.' (John 17:5) and in verse 24 Jesus says to God, 'You loved Me before the foundation of the world.'

Amazingly, this tells us that before Creation, Christ was already there with God the Father, a Father Who loved His Son. There was a personal relationship of love and communication. Christians believe not only that God is there but that He **always WAS there**. And **then** came Creation.


Elsewhere in the Bible we read that originally God existed and the whole material world was brought into being by Him. Therefore **it did have an absolute beginning.** This is how most Jewish scholars have understood these verses.

Many Christian scientists consider that the universe has been created by a personal, all powerful, all wise, and faithful God Who is distinct from the universe. Matter is not eternal (only God is) and the world is entirely dependent on Him for its existence.

God is intimately involved in sustaining every aspect of His creation moment by moment. The laws of nature are expressions of God's normal activity in the world. They are not the direct activity of God but the operation of powers and processes which God created and upholds.

Because God is infinite He created out of nothing, ex nihilo. Genesis 1

describes God as bringing things into existence by divine fiat: He had only to say the word and it was done. Verse 1 describes God creating the heavens and the earth (the universe): the Hebrew phrase 'heavens and the earth' is a Hebrew way of saying 'universe'. Interestingly, the Hebrew uses a **special word** 'bara' for 'create' in three places: first, when



Genesis 1:2 goes on, *Now the earth was without form and empty, and darkness was over the surface of the deep*. When first created the earth is said to be shapeless and empty. Importantly, the writer adds, *And the Spirit of God was hovering over the waters*. So the third person in the Trinity of Father, Son and Holy Spirit was also present at the dawn of Creation.

God had created bare being but no differentiation which is introduced by the well-known commands 'let there be' Verse 3 provides the first example: 'Let there be light', adding 'and there was light.' These creative commands, 'let there be'; or 'let' occur seven times, indicating that the author is concerned with symbolism, especially of numbers.

We also have the first of several statements describing God's workmanship as 'good.' *God saw that the light was good*. The phrase 'it was good' is repeated in verses 10, 12, 18, 21 and 25 which we shall discover, is of significance.

Verse 3 continues, He separated the light from the darkness. God called the light 'day' and the darkness He called 'night.'

Finally, this first section of the Creation account ends in verse 5 with, *And there was evening, and there was morning – the first day.*



Everything we see in the world was created by God and belongs to Him. So the Bible starts with the picture of a powerful Supreme Being, but not an impersonal something, but a personal Some **One** Who is capable of love and communication. How wonderful for us!

Make a stained glass jar or window

Enclosed in your booklet this month is a strip of sticky paper that looks like stained glass. Take this and a glass jar, or plastic see through container.

Gently remove the backing





Stick the sheet to the jar or container

Place against a bright window or insert a battery candle and enjoy how the light reflects through the coloured paper.

Alternatively you could stick the sheet on a window and enjoy the colours that shine through.

Jesus, the light of the world

Perhaps you have participated in a Christingle Service, either recently when you took your grandchildren along to celebrate Christmas or some time ago when you yourself were younger? This tradition dates back to Germany in 1747 and was introduced to the UK in the late 1960s.

In our opening piece about the creation of the universe and the coming of light, we discovered that Jesus was there at the beginning too. Elsewhere in the Bible Jesus is described as the Light of the World. When we ponder on the different elements in a Christingle we find that each of the items stands for something.

Did you know

- The word Christingle means **Christ's Light**.
- The **orange** represents the **world**.
- The red ribbon stands for God's love wrapped around the world and for the blood shed by Jesus when He died for us on the Cross so we can be reconciled with God.
- The four sticks point in all the world's directions North,
 South, East and West to show that God's love is for absolutely everyone.
- The **sweets and fruit** are **symbols of God's creation**, the fruits of the earth and His gifts to us. For many they represent the four seasons, spring, summer, autumn and winter.
- In the centre stands the white candle, tall and straight. This
 depicts Jesus, the Light of the World Who brings hope to all
 who live in darkness.

The Jewish festival of Hanukkah - the Festival of Lights

Perhaps you recognise this picture of a **menorah** with seven candles? The seven candles of the menorah initially represented the **seven days of creation**.



The menorah is first mentioned in the book of

Exodus (25:31–40), according to which the design of the lamp was revealed to Moses by God on Mount Sinai. The original menorah, created from solid gold, was placed in the tabernacle in the wilderness, opposite the table of shewbread. It had seven oil lamps that were level with each other—a central stem with three branches curving upward on either side. Later it stood in the Temple in Jerusalem.

In the period between the writing of the last book in the Old Testament, Malachi, and the New Testament, Israel was ruled by a Syrian King, Antiochus, who forced the Jews to worship Greek gods in the Temple dedicated to God. For three years the Jews, led by Judah Maccabee, fought the Syrians and finally won.

The name of the festival, Hanukkah, comes from the Hebrew word for 'dedication' and refers to the Jews' rededication of the Temple in the second century BC after the Greeks had desecrated it by sacrificing to Greek gods. Hanukkah holiday honours the struggle of the Jewish people to restore the Temple of Jerusalem to its intended use.

When the Temple was being cleaned, only a tiny amount of olive oil was found to light the everlasting light. It looked as if this would only last for a single day, but miraculously, the lamp burned for eight days. As an annual reminder of this extraordinary event, Jewish people today celebrate the Eight Days of Hanukkah which they call the **Festival of Lights.**



Because a seven light menorah is permitted only in the Temple, and the lamps burned for eight days, nowadays a Hanukkah menorah (also called a hanukkiyah) has eight branches, plus a raised ninth lamp the shamash (servant) to light the others.

On the first evening of Hanukkah, after sundown, families light one light, either candle or oil, on the right side of the menorah. On the following night a second light is placed to the left of the first but is lit first, and so on, proceeding from placing candles right to left but lighting them from left to right over the eight nights, while reciting prayers and singing songs.

People exchange gifts, eat special dinners, and play dreidel using a four sided spinning top with Hebrew letters on the different faces, all the while remembering their ancestors, who fought to get their temple back.

Day 1: Light: Let there be light! (Genesis 1:1-5)

There are lots of different types of energy, but light is the only kind we can see with our eyes. Light travels like a wave which we can't see with just our eyes - they move far too quickly!

- They travel through space from the Sun.
- It takes 8.3 minutes for light waves to travel from the Sun to the Earth.
- They can travel through vacuums areas where there is no air or water.
- The speed of light (in a vacuum) is constant it is always 186,000 miles per second!

- Light is roughly a million times faster than sound, which travels at around 1,100 feet per second!
- This is why there is a slight gap in time between lightning and thunder.
- Theoretically, nothing can travel faster than the speed of light.

Light is measured in wavelengths on the electromagnetic spectrum which includes all the different types of light. The visible light we humans see only takes up a very small portion of the electromagnetic spectrum. Insects and some animals can see different colours we can't even imagine!

What Is the Spectrum of Light?

White light can be split into a spectrum. When the sun is shining through the clouds made of water droplets in the air, we sometimes see a rainbow, because these droplets cause the light to be split up into the colours it's made from, like a prism. A prism is an object that can break up white light to show the different colours it's made up of. The scientist Isaac Newton realised light was made up of lots of colours.

A rainbow is caused by reflections, refraction and the dispersion of light. The order of colours found in a spectrum is always:

- red
- orange
- yellow
- green
- blue
- indigo
- violet



Light is made up of all these colours mixed together. Do you remember using this mnemonic to help you learn the order of the colours in a spectrum?

A double rainbow is caused by the light being reflected twice from each raindrop. The colours are reversed in the outside arc.

Things appear a certain colour because it's the only colour reflected. A red car is red because it absorbs

all other colours *except* red. Black objects **absorb** all colours and white objects **reflect** all colours. During the summer, you'll stay cooler if you wear light colour clothes.

How Does Light Create Reflections?

Have you noticed that when you walk past a window in a certain light, you can see yourself in the window? But if you walk past the same window at a different time of day, you can't see yourself? When you see yourself, this is a reflection, when light hits a surface and bounces back off.

Different surfaces reflect light in different ways. Light bounces off a surface at the same angle that it hits it. Uneven surfaces scatter light more than smooth surfaces. As mirrors are so smooth they reflect light clearly, so we can see our reflection.

When an object passes in front of a beam of light, it blocks the light, making a shadow. How solid the shadow is, depends on whether the object is opaque (not letting **any** light through), translucent (letting **some** light through) or transparent (letting **all** light through).

When we look at the light, let us remember:

The Lord is God, and He has made His light shine on us.

It started one February

Cynthia writes

One of our three adult sons, David, has been working in Hong Kong for nearly twenty years. In January 2020, I was at the airport there, waiting to catch a flight back to London. During our last few precious moments together, David mentioned that for some time he had been noticing occasional bleeding. He wondered if he ought to 'do something about it?' I urged him to see a doctor as soon as possible but it turned out that he waited a further three weeks before plucking up courage to go and report it.

So at the end of February he suddenly found himself awaiting the results of a biopsy. I was in the daily morning prayer meeting at Highfield Church, when the message came through: he had been diagnosed with colorectal cancer and would shortly be having major surgery. At once the few of us there, including Mike our priest-in-charge, prayed for him.

A few days later in early March we were unexpectedly back in Hong Kong, visiting David in hospital after his first surgery to remove a large tumour. You will recall that spring 2020 was the first big lockdown in the UK. It was also a strict lockdown in Hong Kong. God's timing was perfect. We arrived in Hong Kong on a Friday and by the end of that weekend, the Hong Kong Government had totally closed all borders to foreigners. If we had delayed for even a few hours, we would no longer have been able to enter the country.

There followed months of chemotherapy and numerous sessions of radio therapy. Eventually David was fitted with a stoma bag and began the long process of recuperation. All the time I and others were holding him, his wife and young children in our prayers. I remained in Hong Kong for several months looking after the family to enable our daughter-in-law to visit her husband.

The Chinese surgeon who carried out the original surgery felt it would be impossible to reverse the stoma as the cancer had spread down into the bowel, most of which had been removed. David would never function normally again.

However, in November 2021 and early 2022 another surgeon carried out further procedures, enabling David's body to return to working in the usual way. David continues to be monitored regularly, his body has many scars, but through the Chinese medical professionals, GOD has graciously answered our prayers for a return to good health and worked a miracle.

The photo below shows David (on the left) with three work colleagues, about to start the 30 km Moontrekker overnight trek up over the mountains to the peak on Lantau Island and down the other side – a challenge we could never have imagined possible in 2020. Praise the LORD!



Caraway Chaplaincy

As you'll see on the following pages, we have a wonderful team of Anna Chaplains who are there to support older people in our City. We have enclosed a leaflet with this month's booklet explaining more of how they can support you including a new member to the Team, Rev Dave Hendra, who is specificially a Chaplain for those living with dementia.



Meet our Anna Chaplains

Did you know that our local Caraway Anna Chaplains are part of a much larger national network? Anna Chaplaincy is part of the ecumenical ministry of the Bible Reading Fellowship (BRF). Chaplaincy to Older People was pioneered in Alton, Hampshire, in 2010 by former broadcaster and Licensed Lay Minister, Debbie Thrower, who was the very first Anna Chaplain.

Anna Chaplains are named after the elderly widow Anna, who appears with Simeon in Luke's gospel in the Bible. Although this is a Christian ministry, please note that Anna Chaplains are there for any older person: of strong faith, little faith, or no faith at all. You do not need to have been a 'church-goer' to request support!

As you will see from the snippets below, Anna Chaplaincy may involve visiting older people in residential and nursing homes, sheltered housing, retirement complexes or private homes. The emphasis is on spiritual care but sometimes practical issues play a part. Anna Chaplains also support relatives and carers to understand better the spiritual issues which older people face as they come towards the end of their lives.

An Anna Chaplain has a wider role within the community as an advocate and a champion of the contribution older people make to society and as a voice for those often isolated or housebound.
