While I draw this fleeting breath, when mine eyes shall close in death, when I soar to worlds unknown, see Thee on Thy judgment throne, Rock of Ages, cleft for me, let me hide myself in Thee.

Reflection

This hymn captures the journey of faith, acknowledging sin, recognising grace and embracing redemption. Whilst reflecting on the words of this hymn, let us examine our faith and remember the sacrifice made for us. Rock of Ages is not just a hymn; it is a story of God's unwavering love and righteousness.

The Power of The Cross

John 11:25-26



Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Whoever believes in Me, though he die, yet shall he live, and everyone who lives and believes in Me shall never die. Do you believe this?"

This passage foreshadows Jesus' power over death, which is fully revealed in His own resurrection. Believers can trust in His power to bring life from death. The Resurrection of Jesus Christ is the foundation of the Christian faith. Without the Resurrection, the belief in God's saving grace is destroyed.

John 11:1-44

The story of Lazarus is a significant account in the New Testament.

Lazarus, along with his sisters, Martha and Mary were close friends of
Jesus. Lazarus was raised from the dead by Jesus, demonstrating Christ's

power and foreshadowing His own resurrection.

The story highlights Jesus' authority over death and offers hope for resurrection through faith in Him.

The resurrection was a real, literal, physical raising of Jesus' body from the dead. Jesus was arrested, tried and found guilty of claiming to be king. His torn, bruised, beaten and unrecognisable body hung on the cross between two thieves. After His death, Jesus' body was wrapped in linen cloth, placed in a tomb with a large stone rolled across the opening.

On the third day, an early Sunday morning, Mary Magdalene and another Mary came to the tomb and found it empty. Sitting on the rolled-away stone was an Angel of the Lord, who told them not to be afraid because Jesus had risen. As the women left to tell the disciples, Jesus met them and showed them His nail-pierced hands.

Thomas, a disciple of Jesus, who is known as doubting Thomas, said he would not believe, unless he could see the holes in Jesus' nail-pierced hands.

John 20:24-25

But Thomas, sometimes called the Twin, one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. The other disciples told him,



"We saw the Master." But He said, "Unless I see the nail holes in His hands, put my fingers in the nail holes, and thrust my hand into His side, I won't believe it."

If you are not sure where you will spend eternity, then pray this prayer from your heart with me today:

"Lord Jesus, I thank You for Your sacrifice and resurrection. I believe in You and ask for the forgiveness of my sins and the gift of eternal life. I choose to live the rest of my life for You." Amen


Closing Prayer

Reflection: Rock of Ages

There are many words and phrases used to describe God and today we're looking at our God as the *Rock of Ages*. When everything around us is in turmoil and nothing seems stable or reliable anymore, it's easy to feel overwhelmed. Who can be trusted? Politicians often change their minds; the economy is up and down and our weather is so unpredictable! Our own emotions can often be fickle: one day we're



happy and coping well, another day we may wake up feeling low. We all need stability in our lives, and we can find it, as we look to Jesus our Rock of Ages. Often we refer to a close friend or family member as 'our rock' and say, "I don't know what I'd do without him/her.", and yet even our closest friends can let us down. When we look to Jesus, we can truly say, "He is my rock" - for we know that He is reliable, trustworthy, and will always be there for us. The Bible says:

Trust [confidently] in the LORD forever, for the LORD GOD is an everlasting Rock [the Rock of Ages]. Isaiah 26: 4

Jesus told the story of two men who built houses. One built his house upon the sand - the storm came, winds blew, and his house fell flat. The other built his house upon a rock and

when the storm came and winds blew, his house stood firm. Our lives are like those houses.

On what foundation are we building our lives? Sand or rock; on what our friends, TV or social media tell us or upon the words of Jesus? When we build our thoughts and lives upon God's Word, the precious promises in the Bible and what Jesus has said, then we are building our lives upon the solid rock and when the storms of life come trying to knock us sideways - we may look a little dishevelled - but we'll still be standing! For Jesus said,

"Therefore everyone who hears these words of Mine and puts them into practice is like a wise man who built his house on the rock." Matthew 7:24

A lady I knew, loved to tell me the story of when she was a young girl and swam in the sea in her homeland, Jamaica. One day she was swimming with her older brother, and she got into difficulty. She called to her brother for help. There was a rock nearby, jutting out of the water and her brother yelled back, "Hold on to the rock L, hold on to the rock." She did and was safe, whilst her brother came to rescue her. Next time something unexpected shakes us, let's remember those words and hold on to The Rock. When everything around us is moving and we feel wobbly, we need something/someone steady and stable. At such times we can cry out to the Lord, and He will answer and help us. He is the Rock, which doesn't move - or as someone has sung in more recent years, "The Rock which doesn't roll!"


In the days and weeks ahead, let's each remember to hold on to Jesus and His words.

The Story of Rock of Ages

Perhaps you feel that this month's hymn is rather solemn but as Margaret's reflection mentions, it points to something wonderful about God's love for me and you.

Born in Farnham, in 1740, Augustus Montague Toplady's father was a major in the Royal Marines, dying when Augustus was just five months old. So he grew up an only child, a complex, solitary individual. He attended Westminster School, after which his mother moved with him to Ireland.

Augustus became a Christian at sixteen, and after graduating from Trinity College, Dublin, moved back to Westminster, where he was influenced by preachers such as George Whitefield and John Wesley. Ordained at only 22, he initially served in Blagdon, close to Cheddar Gorge in Somerset. On the one hand, he was gentle, humble, caring and loved by his parishioners. But he was also a loner for much of his short life: sadly he died of consumption (tuberculosis) aged 38.

As Margaret writes, a popular story is that he wrote Rock of Ages on the back of a playing card, while sheltering from a violent storm in a cave in nearby Burrington Combe. Perhaps he had in mind the verse:

Trust in the Lord for ever, for the Lord our Lord is the Rock of Ages. Isaiah 26:4

Christianity differs from other religions in that it confronts the seriousness of sin and its impact on our relationship with God, each other and our world. Last month we reflected on God as mighty Creator, Whose goodness makes Him 'holy' and utterly different from us. We saw that the difference between His goodness and ours, creates a gap between us and God. Nevertheless, God longs for relationship with us, but the Bible tells us that we can do nothing to solve the problem ourselves. Only God can resolve this problem, and He devised a way to bridge the gap by sending His Son Jesus.

Jesus was a real, historical person Who lived and died 2000 years ago in what is now modern day Israel. The evidence for Jesus' existence is overwhelming, not only Christian but secular Roman and Jewish historians of the time have written about Him.

So the question is not, Did Jesus exist? But **Who was He really**?

Many people say He was a good man, a moral teacher, Who taught about love

and modelled a good life. And they are partly right. However, when talking about Himself, Jesus claimed to be the Son of God. He said, "I am the way, and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father, except through Me." John 14:6. Jesus wasn't saying He could point the



way to God, He was claiming to BE the way, the truth and the life.

Why is Easter a particularly important festival for Christians and why is the cross at the heart of the Christian faith? Why do almost one third of the Gospels focus on Jesus' *death*? The answer is that Christians believe it is ONLY through Jesus death and resurrection that our relationship with God is restored.

The Bible tells us that Jesus chose to die on the cross to restore our relationship with God, and demonstrate just how precious each of us is to Him.

Augustus wrote a very personal hymn, using the pronouns, I, my, me. So we read *Not the labour of my hands can fulfil Thy law's demands*.

No matter how hard we try, we cannot meet God's standards. We can't ever be good enough. No matter how earnest we are, how good our intentions or deep our sorrow, only God can rescue us.

Could my tears forever flow All for sin could not atone. Thou must save, and Thou alone.

Augustus admits his helplessness:

Nothing in my hand I bring, Simply to Your cross I cling.

On the cross, Jesus, God Himself, paid the ultimate price we owe. If it were up to you and me to restore the relationship, we could never be absolutely certain we'd done sufficient. Before He died, Jesus called out, "It is finished!" Jesus had completed God's rock solid rescue plan.

You have probably come across this verse: For God so loved the world that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life. John 3:16.

If we trust Him, God is indeed our Rock of Ages.



His hands and feet were well bloodied.



to His God.



April Fools' Trivia

The tradition of April Fools began with the change from the Julian calendar to the Gregorian calendar in the 16th century. In the Julian calendar the New Year began in April. When in 1582 Pope Gregory XIII replaced the calendar, the New Year changed to begin with January. Despite most



countries adhering to it, the news failed to reach many people and in France they continued to celebrate New Year in April. The people that knew about the change started calling them 'April Fools' and played tricks on them and this spread across the world. The last countries to convert to the Gregorian calendar were Russia (1918) and Greece (1923). Both countries, however, continue to follow the Julian calendar for liturgical purposes, hence they have different dates for Easter and Christmas.

April Fools' Day traditions in other countries

England – A rule has been stipulated that pranks and hoaxes are allowed until noon only. Anyone breaking the rule is taunted with: "April Fools' Day past and gone, you're the fool for making one."

France and Italy - April Fools is called "Poisson d'Avril" and "Pesce d'Aprile" respectively. It means April Fish, because it coincided with Lent, when meat was forbidden and fish was eaten instead. Children tape a picture of a fish on the backs of their colleagues and wait for the transgression to be discovered.

Brazil – The date became famous in Brazil after a satirical publication called 'A Mentira' (the Lie) announced in 1828 that Don Pedro, Emperor of Brazil had died.

Scotland – Scotland liked it so much they extended the date to two days. The first day they try to send a friend on a fools' errand and on the second day, the 'Taily Day' they tape a sign 'Kick me' on the posterior of any unsuspecting victim!

Poland – Pranks are allowed but serious activities are avoided. This conviction is so strong that when the alliance with Leopold I (Holy Roman Emperor) against the Turks was signed on 1st April 1683, it was backdated to 31st March!








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














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
