Reflection

Written in 1884, by Swiss evangelist Edmond Burdy, '*Thine be the Glory*' was translated into English in 1923 by Baptist Minister, Richard Birch Hoyle.With a strong theology, based on the Bible accounts of Jesus' resurrection, it is set to a tune composed by George Frideric Handel.

In verse 2 we hear St Paul's words telling us how, by Jesus being raised from the tomb, death has lost its sting. *1 Corinthians 15:55*.

Verse 3 reminds how we can overcome our doubts; it gives us confidence in believing that through Jesus' victory over death we are saved.

The chorus joyfully expresses the central message of our Christian faith; the hymn displays the glory and brilliance of Jesus' resurrection, encourages us to shed all our fears and give thanks to God for Jesus, His Son, our everlasting Saviour.

Bible reading Matthew 28:16-20 NIV



Then the eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain where Jesus had told them to go. When they saw Him, they worshipped Him; but some doubted. Then Jesus came to them and said: "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to Me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." After Jesus' resurrection Jesus made many appearances to the disciples. Before returning to His heavenly home Jesus gave the disciples '**The Great Commission'.** He commands us to share His good news - we do that believing Jesus' promise:

'I am with you always, to the very end of the age.'

Reflection Thine be the Glory

I have chosen this hymn for my funeral, it's such a wonderful celebration of God's victory over death. Ever since the first humans disobeyed our Creator, death has come in and dogged us; sin cuts us off from the One Who loves us. But God took the curse upon Himself by entering the world in Jesus His Son; in

some mysterious way, Jesus' perfect life and willing selfsacrifice have cancelled the curse. He has risen from the grave and death is defeated. By faith we can share in this victory.



The hymn doesn't simply look back and describe how Jesus revealed Himself to His disciples all those years ago, it tells us how Jesus meets us today; "*Lo Jesus meets us*". We are as close to Jesus now, in 2025, as were those disciples on the first resurrection morning. True, we can't see Him with our eyes, but nor could the disciples see Him all the time; Jesus came and went, for a period of 40 days, after which He went back to His Father. They, like us, had to get used to trusting Him even when He seemed absent.

"Lovingly He greets us." When Jesus appeared to the disciples on the evening of His resurrection He could have rebuked them for the way they had let Him down; they had all fled, and three times Peter denied he had even known Him.



Yet Jesus' first words were "Peace", "I'm not holding your failure against you". I find that very encouraging; when we mess up and accuse ourselves of hopeless failure, Jesus greets us lovingly, "peace". *"Lead us in Thy triumph to Thy home above."* The apostle Paul saw his mission to preach as a triumphant procession, led by the victorious Christ, a fragrance rising up to God. *"Thank God, He has made us His captives, and leads us along"*

in Christ's triumphal procession" (2 Corinthians 2:14). In trust and obedience to Christ we too can be victorious over the sin in our lives, useful to God in His service, a fragrance of Christ; we are being led to the home God has prepared for us with Him in heaven. *David Corfe*



The Story of 'Thine be the glory'

Edmond Louis Budry, author of this month's hymn, *Thine be the glory, risen, conquering Son,* was born in Vevey, a tiny, picturesque town on Lake Geneva in Switzerland, in 1854. Edmond studied theology in Lausanne, where he acted as a free church pastor for several years. After this he returned to Vevey, becoming minister of the Swiss *Eglise évangélique du Canton de Vaud* for the next 35 years until retirement.



À *Toi la Gloire: To God be the glory,* is the most well-known of the hymns Edmond wrote. Composed in 1884 to accompany the rousing chorus *See the conquering hero comes* ...' from George Frideric Handel's oratorio, Judas Maccabaeus, (composed 140 years earlier), it is thought that it was the death of his first wife which inspired Edmond. In 1885 it was published in a French hymn book *Chants Evangéliques*, but not translated into English until 1923. Edmond died in 1932. The hymn takes us through the events of that first Easter Sunday over 2000 years ago. Jesus' friends were grief stricken, terrified of the brutal authorities who had crucified Jesus, Whom they had followed with such high hopes. In fact, they went into immediate hiding. All at once someone knocked on the



door and there was a distraught Mary Magdalene, who explained she'd come from the tomb, where the enormous stone at the entrance had been moved and the body had disappeared. So Peter and John ran to investigate, John arriving first but not going in. Naturally, Peter

impulsively rushed inside. But instead of Jesus' body, he found the burial clothes in which Jesus had been wrapped, folded neatly. What on earth had happened?!

As the day wore on, it became clear that Jesus' body hadn't been stolen but that He had risen.

'Angels in bright raiment, rolled the stone away, Kept the folded grave clothes where Thy body lay.'

However, no one was expecting a miracle. Peter and John left the tomb, puzzled and sceptical, but Mary lingered, becoming the first to encounter the risen Jesus. She didn't recognise Him, so when He asked why she was crying, Mary assumed He was a gardener who'd taken Jesus' body. But when Jesus tenderly spoke her name, Mary immediately knew Who He was.

Jesus then asked her to tell the other disciples.

Luke reports that her story seemed like nonsense. So that evening the fearful disciples were still cowering behind locked doors. Jesus came and stood

among them with the words, "Peace be with you," scattering 'fear and gloom.'

Jesus didn't chide the disciples for lack of belief, (their first reaction was to think He was a ghost), instead showing them His hands and side, and asking for something to eat! Jesus knew they required more tangible evidence of seeing His wounds, hearing Him speak and touching Him.

Some of us resemble Mary, not sure what we are looking for, but aware that something is incomplete in our lives. Or we may struggle with faith like doubting Thomas, wanting concrete proof.

Edmond knew that Jesus' Resurrection is central to Christian faith. Indeed, Paul wrote that if Christ has **not** been raised, Christianity is meaningless. If Jesus really **did** rise on that first Easter day, the implications are staggering.

Jesus is not put off by our questions, but comes to find you and me just where we are, to call us by name, and gently invite us to believe and follow Him. God can be trusted, forgiveness through Jesus is possible, '*death has lost its sting*,' and eternal life can be ours. Knowing a risen Jesus transformed the lives of Mary and the disciples. As Edmond wrote,

'Life is naught without Thee: aid us in our strife.'

Jesus promised that all who trust Him will share in His resurrection life.

"I am the Resurrection and the Life. Whoever believes in Me, though he die, yet shall he live." John 11:25

So if we trust in Jesus, with Edmond Budry, we can sing confidently,

'Thine be the glory, risen, conquering Son!'



Why Christians believe in Jesus' Resurrection

- We know from non-Christian historical accounts that without doubt, Jesus really did die on the Cross. Tacitus and Josephus mention Christ and describe how Christians endured torture, when simply renouncing Him would end it.
- **Diverse sources.** The Gospel writers included different details, and material from a variety of sources **all of which agreed** on the fact of the Resurrection.
- We have evidence from **contemporary eyewitnesses** that Jesus appeared in a real, transformed body to many people after His death. Paul spoke of how Christ appeared, alive, to over 500 at once and he was writing not long after the event occurred. So what happened in between?

• On Easter Day the tomb was found empty. An empty tomb is not proof of

a resurrection. However, the site of Jesus' tomb was well known to Romans, Jews and the new Christians. A movement founded on the belief that Jesus had risen, could never have started in the very city in which He had been publicly executed and buried, if the tomb was **not** empty.



- Indeed, no one disputed that the tomb was empty. The question was always, 'What has happened to the body?' In fact, it was the Jewish authorities who invented the story that the guards had fallen asleep, whilst the body was stolen. They did so, because they knew that the tomb was empty.
- The account of the empty tomb is **very early**, from before AD 37. A legendary story could never have been concocted in such a short time, whilst eyewitnesses were still living.
- The Gospel accounts about the women finding the tomb empty are extremely **straightforward and simple**, in contrast to fictional accounts from 200 years later, which contain unrealistic details typical of legends.

- The unanimous account that the empty tomb was discovered by **women** argues for this to be true, as legends would have made men (considered more reliable witnesses at the time) the discoverers.
- Jesus' friends had **no motive** to steal His body, hide it and then proclaim He had risen, since they knew this lie would plunge them into very grave danger.
- No early church debate: the raising of Jesus from the dead by God was the central belief of the new Christians. The early Church debated many fundamental issues, but not the Resurrection. They had to be quite sure it was true, since many went on to be martyred for refusing to deny the Resurrection.
- **Testimony of the twelve disciples.** Initially dejected and terrified, following Christ's death, they preached the gospel message, empowered by seeing Christ alive and receiving His Holy Spirit.
- **Transformation of Paul** who went from persecutor to believer after seeing Christ alive and was martyred at the end of his missionary journeys.
- **Centuries of world-wide martyrs**. Christians, from the Church's first days to our own, continue to be willing to die for their conviction that Christ rose from the dead.
- Jesus did not die again: Other resurrections are mentioned in the Bible, including that of Jesus' friend Lazarus who later died in the usual way, but Christ is unique as He rose never to die again.
- **Rise of a historical religion.** Christianity spread and grew even though, as Paul told Christians from the beginning, "If Christ has not been raised, your faith is vain." 1 Corinthians 15:17
- If Jesus was not raised from the dead, Christianity falls apart. But Jesus meant it when He stated, 'I am the Resurrection and the Life.' So believers in Jesus are promised that we can die in the confident expectation



that we too will share in His eternal resurrection life.

VE Day – 80 years anniversary

Some of our most senior readers may have childhood memories of Victory in Europe (VE) Day. And if you didn't experience the celebrations personally, perhaps you, like me, can recall your parents and other family members telling you about it.



On 8 May 2025 we shall be recalling that momentous occasion when the successor to Adolf Hitler, who had committed suicide on 30 April, signed the document in which Germany agreed to an unconditional surrender. This marked the end of World War II in Europe, (Japan did not surrender until 15 August).

More than one million people poured on to the streets of London, celebrating with great jubilation in Trafalgar Square, along the Mall and all around Buckingham Palace. Here, King George V, Queen Elizabeth and their two daughters, Princess Elizabeth and Princess Margaret, were joined on the balcony by Winston



Churchill, the Prime Minister, and Ernest Bevin conducted the crowds in singing 'For he's a jolly good fellow'. All across other towns and cities in the UK there were street parties and singing in the streets.

In the United States, President Harry Truman dedicated the victory to former President Franklin D Roosevelt, who sadly, had died of a brain haemorrhage on 12 April 1945. Flags remained at half-mast for the rest of the thirty-day period of mourning.

This year, 2025, marks 80 years since this significant date and many cities, towns and villages will be finding ways of paying tribute to that courageous and steadfast generation who fought for the freedom we currently enjoy.






