HARK! THE HERALD ANGELS SING

This is probably one of the best-known and much-loved Christmas carols. It was written by Charles Wesley in 1739 – just a year after his conversion. The wonder of his newfound Christian faith was still fresh in his mind and the hymn is full of wonderful Christian truths, hopes and comforts. As we come to worship God, let's think together about some of these truths.

'Hark'

The hymn begins with a call for us to 'hark', to pay attention, to listen to the message that the angels are singing. They said, 'I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people.' Luke 2:10

Stop for a moment and listen to that message, let it sink in and appreciate again the deep joy that comes from knowing Jesus. We too can join with the words of the hymn 'Joyful all the nations rise'.

Prayer



Lord God, help me to listen to Your voice. Help me to be still and to know that You are Emmanuel, God with us, and to be filled with Your inexpressible joy.

'Glory to the newborn King'

The baby Jesus may seem cute, vulnerable and adorable, just like all newborn babies, but He is King; King of the Universe. In Jesus we see God's glory, in other words we see what God is like. As John wrote at the start of his gospel. We have seen His glory, the glory of the one and only Son, Who came from the Father,

full of grace and truth.' John 1:4

But we don't just see His glory, we give glory back to God, in the words that we say and the lives that we live. So spend a few moments to think how you will give glory to the newborn King today.

'Hail the Incarnate Deity'

These are complicated words, but incarnate means 'in the flesh'; Jesus really was a human baby, but this line of the hymn reminds us that the baby was also God Himself; God became just like us, entering this world as a vulnerable baby. As Paul wrote in Philippians 2:7 He made Himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness.

Prayer



Lord God, we thank You that You came to live among us. May we know you as Emmanuel, God with us, and may we share Your presence with those around us.

God and sinners reconciled!

Jesus came, not just to show us what God is like and to teach us how to live, but he came to make peace between us and God. It is because Jesus came, lived, died and rose again that we can call God our Father and our Friend.

Born that we no more may die Prayer



Lord God, thank You that Jesus was 'born that we no more may die'.

Be with those who are grieving, help them and us to have confidence in Your promise of eternal life for those who put their trust in You.

Peace on earth, and mercy mild

Jesus came to make peace between us and God. This restored relationship with God should help us to live at peace with each other. Jesus said, "Blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called the children of God."

Prayer

Lord God, we hear Your promise of 'peace on earth', yet we know that there are wars and conflicts in many places around the world. You are the Prince of Peace, and we pray for places at war that You will establish Your peace.

Almighty Father, govern the hearts and minds of those in authority, and bring the nations, divided and torn apart by the ravages of sin, to be subject to Your just and gentle rule; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Final Prayer

Lord Jesus, we praise You that as our King, You came to us as Jesus, bringing peace and reconciliation.

Thank You for laying aside Your glory to give us new life.

Help us joyfully to join with the heavenly hosts to proclaim Your birth.

Come and make Your home in our hearts, as we receive Your new life.

Amen.



Reflection

For God so loved the world, that He gave His one and only Son, that whoever believes in Him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send His Son into the world to condemn the world but to save the world through Him. John 3:16-17

I wonder how you're feeling as Christmas approaches. In December we often find ourselves looking back over the year and pondering all that has happened. As we do so, we may find ourselves thankful for many blessings and precious happy memories. But for others of us, 2025 may have been a difficult year with health issues, grief at the death of family members or friends, increasing frailty and feelings of isolation and being forgotten. Whilst some of us can look forward to celebrating Christmas, others may feel there is little to rejoice over.



The Bible verses above tell us the true reason for Christmas, when God became personally involved in our troubled world with a plan to rescue humanity and restore our relationship with Himself. Our carol illustrates that His rescue mission began over 2000

years ago, when Jesus was born in an outbuilding in a small Middle Eastern village in an outpost of the Roman Empire.

The word 'hark' is an archaic command telling us to 'listen up', to pay attention to something important. So 'Hark! The herald angels sing' is alerting us to these messenger angels' proclamation of Christ's birth.

Based on Luke 2:8-14, the carol describes the announcement of Jesus' birth by an angelic chorus, the night sky above a group of shepherds ringing with joyful praise for the newborn King. The first two lines paraphrase the words in Luke's gospel: Glory to God in the highest,



and on earth peace, good will toward men, summarised by Wesley, the hymn's author, as God and sinners reconciled.

The second half of the verse Joyful all ye nations rise; join the triumph of the skies exhorts us humans to gaze heavenward and lift our voices alongside the angels to declare Christ is born in Bethlehem.

Whom are we worshipping? None other than *Christ, by highest heaven adored!* We have a God Who chose to experience the limitations of being human, knowing that we'd find it easier to relate to Him if He came in human form. *Offspring of the virgin's womb,* God the incarnate Deity identifying with us, pleased as man with man to dwell, Jesus, our Emmanuel.

Emmanuel means 'God with us.' The God of the Bible is not only pure, holy and just, He is a personal God Who is not remote but cares about each of us and every detail in our daily lives.

The final verse describes Jesus as the heaven born Prince of Peace! Picture language depicts Him as the Sun of righteousness rising with healing in His wings. The hymn acknowledges Jesus leaving heavenly glory: Mild He lays His glory by, to offer salvation through dying on our behalf born that man no more may die.... and thus, to provide a 'second' or spiritual rebirth.

At the heart of the Christmas account and this carol are offers of comfort and hope.

Comfort - Jesus faced hardship, fear, and loss, meaning we can be confident He understands our struggles. When we are fearful, He feels our pain and yearns to comfort us. This Christmas He is still here right by our side, offering to support us with His presence wherever we find ourselves: at home, in our room in a residential setting, alone or with others.


Hope - Christmas did not end with the Baby in a manger. Born into poverty, Jesus became a refugee, growing up in an occupied nation. The adult Jesus achieved His rescue mission to save us through His death and resurrection, which offer us real hope to our life's end.

We can be assured that Jesus will be beside us in whatever situation we find ourselves this Christmas, no matter what kind of year we've experienced, and whatever Christmas we're anticipating.

The opening verse says *Peace on earth*. Harmony between nations is vital but of ultimate significance is peace with God.

So why not unwrap those two gifts of comfort and hope?





The story of Hark! The Herald Angels Sing

This popular carol was written in 1739 by Methodist Charles Wesley, who composed over 6,500 hymns. The words *God and sinners reconciled* reflect the fact that Charles wrote it shortly after his conversion. The title was *Hymn for Christmas Day* accompanied by a solemn tune, to help people understand the gravity of what God was doing in sending His Son. Charles



included the original ten verses in a collection entitled Songs and Sacred

Poems. The words were old fashioned, 'hark how all the welkin rings, glory to the King of kings', Old English for 'sky', 'heavens' or 'firmament'!

However, in 1753 preacher George Whitefield changed that to today's lyric: Hark! The Herald Angels sing, "Glory to the newborn King" and published this version in his 1754 Collection of Hymns for Social Worship. A second change in the 1782 Tate and Brady New Version of the Psalms of David incorporated the lines Hark! The Herald Angels sing, "Glory to the newborn King" as a refrain after each stanza, which is how we typically sing it. These changes were welcomed by neither Charles nor his brother John, who discouraged editing of their meticulously crafted hymns.

Whitefield's amendment allowed worshippers to personally participate in the Biblical narrative. We are not simply overhearing the angels but encouraged to raise our own hallelujahs to the *newborn King*, emphasising the miracle of *Emmanuel*, God with us.

A century later, William Hayman Cummings, professor and tenor at the Royal Academy of Music proposed the tune with which we are familiar. Cummings personally encountered Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847) as a teenager, when he sang in the chorus directed by the composer at the London première of *Elijah* in 1847. He realised that Mendelssohn's rousing Gutenberg cantata *Festgesang*, composed in 1840 to



commemorate the 400th anniversary of the invention of the printing press and movable type, would suit the carol's revised words. Although he had to edit words and music, eventually the wonderfully majestic version we sing at Christmas emerged. This blending of secular music with a sacred text (against the intentions of both original authors) was a stroke of genius.

In Britain, *Hark! The Herald Angels Sing* is commonly performed using Cummings' harmonisation of the Mendelssohn tune for the first two verses but adding a soprano descant and a last verse for organ by Sir David Willcocks, famous as the director from 1957-1974 of the chapel choir of King's College, Cambridge.

Knit an Angel

Pattern contains instructions for the basic angel with adaptations for the plain angel in *italics*.

Abbreviations

k = knit

p = purl

stocking stitch = alternate knit and purl rows

k1, p1 rib = alternate knit and purl stitches on all rows

k2tog = decrease by knitting two stitches together


kfb = increase by knitting into the front and back of the same stitch

m1 = increase by picking up strand between stitches with right hand needle from front to back, passing onto left hand needle and knitting into back of stitch

yo = bring yarn to front and then over needle between the k1 and k2tog

To make the angels:

You need to know how to decrease using k2tog and increase using m1 and kfb. As well, obviously, as how to knit and purl, cast on and cast off.



Pattern

DK yarn and UK 11 (3mm) needles. Tension: 26 stitches for 4 ins = 10cm

Cast on 40 stitches. Leave enough yarn to sew up the skirt.

Knit 3 rows

Next 13 rows as follows: k1 then repeat (k1, yo, k2tog) to end

If you want a plain skirt just work 13 rows of stocking stitch starting with a purl row.

Decrease row: k1, then repeat (k2tog, k1) to end [27 sts]

Next 7 rows: single k1, p1 rib {odd rows start with a purl and even ones

(right side) with a knit}

Shape top: k1, repeat (k2tog) to end [14 sts] Then k2, k2tog twice, k2, k2tog twice, k2 [10 sts] Stocking stitch 2 rows starting with knit row.

Shape head: k3, increase using kfb four times, k3 [14 sts]

Next 7 rows: stocking stitch Decrease: (k2tog) to end [7 sts]

Draw yarn through stitches and leave a long enough piece to sew down the back to waist.

Join back seam and thread a piece of yarn starting at the back seam through all stitches below increase row for head.

Stuff head with small piece of toy filling or a few scraps of yarn. Then pull threaded yarn tight and make a double knot.

Thread free ends through head, pull slightly and cut off yarn. This will lose them.

Wings

Cast on 25 stitches
Row 1 is right side
Every row except 2–5 is: cast off 2, knit to end
Rows 2 & 4: cast off 2, k10, m1, k1, m1, k10
Rows 3 & 5: cast off 2, k9, m1, k1, m1, k11
Last row is cast off 2
Leave long tail to sew wings to body.

Sew in starting tail nearly on wrong side as both sides of the wings will be visible. Use the other end of yarn to sew wings to body, with right side to front and top of centre of wings a row or two below the neck and the stitches through the centre of the wings up the back seam.



Names

Names are special and have meanings. Do you know the meaning of your name? For instance, the name John means 'God is gracious', the name Carol 'free person or song', the name Peter 'rock'. We named our sons after their Dad and other significant people in our lives. Other children are named after a grandparent, but Jesus' name was chosen by GOD.

Jesus is the Greek form of Joshua, meaning 'the LORD saves'. It shows that Jesus is the One prophesied in the Old Testament Who will save His people from the consequences of their sins. Jesus' Name was chosen to reflect Who He was (and still is). He is still the LORD Who saves, He is still Immanuel, God with us.

His Name as foretold by Isaiah in Chapter 9 is 'Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace'. He still imparts peace to those who trust Him today and of His peace there is no end. He was born to be our Friend and to show what God is like and how much God loves each one of us. Perhaps during this Christmas, we can find time to worship Him just as the shepherds did all those years ago. Let's spend a moment thanking God for giving us Jesus our Saviour and receive Him into our hearts and lives today.



The Power of The Name of Jesus

When you are tired, frightened, lonely, sick, in any form of need – just say His Name. The Name of Jesus brings peace, protection, provision, health, hope, salvation and His very presence.

Mary will give birth to a Son, and you are to give Him **the Name Jesus**, because He will save His people from their sin. Matthew 1:21

Jesus said...Whatever you ask **in my Name**, this I will do, that the Father may be glorified in the Son. If you ask me anything **in my Name**, I will do it.

John 14:13-14

And there is salvation in no one else, for **there is no other Name** under heaven given among men by which we must be saved. Acts 4:12



This psalm may have been the inspiration for the doxology which concludes Bishop Ken's hymns Awake my soul and Glory to Thee. The dictionary defines a doxology as a hymn or liturgical formula ascribing glory to God.

Have you noticed the following features about Ann's illustration? *She explains:*

The single capital P is related to the flowers - primrose, pansy, pink, poppy and pimpernel, and the peacock butterfly in addition to the opening word.



Angel Cake

Ingredients (for three people)

25 g unsalted butter 75 g caster sugar 2 large eggs 75 g plain flour drop of yellow food colouring drop of pink food colouring drop of lemon extract or juice Teaspoon strawberry or raspberry jam



butter cream

50 g butter 100 g icing sugar ½ tablespoon milk

Topping

100 g icing sugar and water to make glacé icing

Method

Pre-heat the oven to 170 Fan or Gas Mark 5

Use a sheet of grease proof paper to divide the tin into three equal sections and grease

Melt the butter, remove from heat, set aside

Beat the sugar & eggs until pale cream

Stir 5th of the mixture into the melted butter

Pour the butter mix into the creamed sugar & egg mix; combine with the flour Divide the mix between three bowls

Leave bowl 1 plain

Add drop of pink colouring & jam to bowl 2

Add drop of yellow colouring & lemon extract/juice to bowl 3

Pour one of the batters into each of the three sections in the loaf tin

Bake 12-15 mins until probe comes out clean & leave to cool

Place on a wire rack

Make the butter cream

Beat butter, sugar, milk, vanilla with whisk until creamy

Assemble the sponge

Spread a layer of butter cream over the plain sponge & top with the jam sponge

Add a layer of butter cream & top with the lemon sponge

Topping

Top EITHER with remaining butter cream OR a layer of glacé icing
